The Chamber's first arrival (new member) for 1987 is Southeastern Health Fitness Center in Jackson Heights, Murfreesboro. Owner Eddie DeFord said his staff is anxious to get involved in Chamber projects this year.

DeFord gives much of the credit for Southeastern's success to his staff that includes Manager Don Duplass. A native of Louisiana, Don is a dedicated example of hard work, good health and proper diet. He has degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi and Louisiana State. His sports achievements include awards in football and track. A professional football career was short-lived due to a serious knee injury.

Don has received regional and national honors for body building.

He captured the Mr. New Orleans and Mr. Louisiana honors in 1960 and repeated the feat in 1984. Also during those years, he chalked up titles in World Class Bodybuilding Competition.



Tommy Temple Martin President, 1943

Tommy Temple Martin is a mover and a shaker. He knows how to get a job done and rarely takes the credit due him. "God has really blessed Rutherford County and He has blessed me. If the Lord granted me an opportunity to live my life over, I wouldn't change a thing," he recently commented while reminiscing about his successful insurance business and rewarding civic life.



Tommy came to Rutherford County in 1934 from Athens, Alabama, and within a year accepted an opportunity with Mutual of New York Insurance Company. Fifty years later, it is obvious that he made the right decision.

"I've always wanted to help people," he remarked. That's one of the reasons he got involved in the Chamber of Commerce after starting his insurance career.

"The heart of our county, then and now, includes the churches, civic clubs and businesses. The Chamber is the pulse of the community," he continued.

In 1943, when Tommy served as President of the Chamber, local industries could be counted on your fingers. They included a creamery, Carnation Milk, a hosiery mill and cedar bucket factory. Though he declines any credit, Tommy has been a strong recruiter for industry, including General Electric and State Farm Insurance.

"A highlight for me was in 1947 when G.E. came here. Ronald Reagan was a public relations spokesman for them and I had an opportunity to introduce him during a meeting in Murfreesboro," he recalled.

In 1955, MONY Insurance named him "Man of the Year" for their company. He made the Million Dollar Roundtable, Honor Club and Hall of Fame. Recently the Tommy Martin Chair of Insurance was established at Middle Tennessee State University.

To describe Tommy Martin, you could quote from an article that appeared in the Nashville Tennessean on July 22, 1962. It read in part — "He is regarded as one of the most successful insurance salesmen in the nation. He is one of those go-go-go guys. When others are wanting to appoint a committee to study a thing, Tommy is off and running. People love his speeches. You never understand where all that energy comes from."

In 1980 the Chamber named him a lifetime MEMBER EMERITUS. He was presented a plaque that reads — "For his many years of unselfish devotion to the welfare of this community, he deserves the undying gratitude of the Chamber members and countless others whose lives he has touched."

Anyone can give advice but advice from Tommy Temple Martin is worthy of consideration. He says it this way — "There is a golden opportunity for anyone in Rutherford County. Find a church and attend it with your family. Listen to the advice of successful business people. Always tell the truth, and finally, early to bed, early to rise, work hard and advertise!"



Baker takes post as Regan resigns

WASHINGTON (AP) — Donald T. Regan, President Reagan's strong-willed chief of staff, resigned under fire Friday and was replaced by former Senate Republican leader Howard H. Baker Jr., who abandoned his own presidential ambitions to help restore the administration's tattered credibility.

The resignation and the appointment were announced simultaneously just one day after the Tower investigating commission blamed Regan for the "chaos that descended upon the White House" after the disclosure of the Iran-Contra affair last November.

In a one-sentence letter to Reagan, Regan said, "I hereby resign as chief of staff to the president of the United States."

Regan had been the target of a determined campaign by first lady Nancy Reagan to force him from the White House. She had complained to friends that Regan was not doing enough to protect the president as his administration became enmeshed in the Iran-Contra affair.

In its report Thursday, the Tower commission excoriated Regan, saying that as one of the most powerful chiefs of staff in recent history, he should have done more to shield the president.

Critics — including many on Cap-

itol Hill — had urged Regan's ouster to give the White House a fresh start. They had accused Regan of being arrogant and unwilling to deal with members of Congress.

It was not clear immediately whether there would be a staff shakeup beyond Regan. Other key presidential aides, including Secretary of State George Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, were criticized by the Tower commission, although less harshly than Regan.

Baker, who was Senate majority leader during the first four years of Reagan's presidency, told a news conference that he took the White House job "with the full knowledge this will eliminate me as a candidate for president (in 1988). You can't do both."

"Ronald Reagan is an historic president," he said. "If we go forward, credibility will follow."

Baker, a 61-year-old Tennessean, is a onetime political rival of Reagan's who competed for the 1980 Republican presidential nomination, but eventually endorsed Reagan. Despite his national reputation, Baker remained a longshot for the 1988 nomination.

Regan called Baker "a distinguished American" and a man (Please see Baker, page two)

Baker's Tennessee friends wish him well in new post

The Tennessee friends of Howard Baker wished the former senator well Friday after he took over Donald Regan's job as President Reagan's White House chief of staff.

Democrats and Republicans alike heaped praise on Reagan for choosing the Tennessee Republican, whose 18 years in the Senate included four years as majority leader.

"I think it was a stroke of genius on the part of the White House," said Sen. Jim Sasser, D-Tenn., who served with Baker for eight years.

"I think Howard Baker brings to the White House the credibility that is desperately needed at this time," Sasser said.

Ron McMahan, Baker's press secretary from 1970-81 and now editor-publisher of The Knoxville Journal, agreed his former boss was a perfect choice to help Reagan put the Iran-Contra scandal behind him.

"It's fitting he's going back to Washington where this time he'll have to ask President Reagan what he'd he know and when he'd he know

Baker, as a member of the Watergate committee probing then-President Richard Nixon's role in that scandal, asked what became the key question of what Nixon knew and when he knew it.

Baker's wife, Joy, was contacted in Bal Harbour, Fla., where she is on vacation and told The Knoxville News-Sentinel she was "thrilled" to be returning to Washington.

"I am delighted to be closely associated with Nancy again, she's such a lovely person," Mrs. Baker told the newspaper. "Contrary to most media reports, she is not difficult to get along with."

The Bakers were host to the Reagans in 1976 when Baker, although state manager for Gerald Ford's presidential bid, invited the campaigning Reagans to stay at his Huntsville, Tenn., home on a Tennessee swing.

Mrs. Baker told The Knoxville Journal she wouldn't miss her husband's expected run for the 1988 presidency.

"I can't say I'm going to miss

News of Baker's appointment also drew praise from Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., who was in Switzerland for an arms control conference, and from Democratic Gov. Ned McWherter in Nashville.

"This is the absolute best choice the president could make," Gore said in a statement. "It will go a long way toward restoring confidence in his presidency and will reassure many in the Congress who know and greatly respect Sen. Baker's ability."

Gore said the entire nation should appreciate Baker's sacrifice in giving up a run for the presidency and added that a side benefit is that Baker will be able to advise Reagan on filling a vacancy on the Tennessee Valley Authority's board of directors.

McWherter said the way Tennessee will benefit is secondary to how the national interest will be served by Baker's appointment.

"I think it means more for the nation right now, maybe the world," McWherter said. "Howard Baker will do an outstanding job. He will bring credibility in that office that needs to
