General Information

The Lovett School is an independent, college preparatory day school for boys and girls in kindergarten through grade 12. The school was founded in 1926 by Eva Edwards Lovett as an elementary school whose purpose was to educate the whole child. Growth and expansion have changed the physical aspect of the school, but its mission remains that of Mrs. Lovett, the education of the whole child, intellectually, emotionally, and spiritually.

Campus

Located on 100 acres in northwest Atlanta, The Lovett School is bordered by the Chattahoochee River, Paces Ferry Road, and Northside Parkway. The Preschool is housed in the Martha Woolman Hall, a short distance from the main campus. Class-rooms are located in the Lower School building, the Middle School building, and the Upper School building, each of which is connected to the Alston Memorial Chapel and the Humanities Center. The Humanities Center houses the 36,000 volume Vasser-Woolley Library for Middle School and Upper School students; music, drama, and art suites; the Galleria exhibition area; the lecture hall; the bookstore; the student commons; the student lounge; two computer centers; and the Study Lab. The Lower School Library is a unique facility with its carpeted story-telling area for younger children and two glass window bays with seats for reading. The main gymnasium is located in the Student Activities Center and another gymnasium is available for the Lower and Middle School students. Other athletic facilities include a natatorium, multipurpose classrooms, and training and weight rooms; the Martin E. Kilpatrick Memorial Stadium and track; eleven tennis courts; a collegiate-size soccer field; three practice fields and a baseball field.

Faculty

D. Alvin Cash was appointed headmaster in 1983. A graduate of The University of Virginia (B.A.), he also holds an M. Div. degree from The Fuller Theological Seminary, and an M. Ed. degree from The College of William and Mary. Before coming to The Lovett School, he served as Director of the Lower School at Norfolk Academy (1969-77) and as Headmaster of Athens Academy (1977-83).

The faculty and administrators hold 149 baccalaureate and 83 graduate degrees from such colleges and universities as Agnes Scott, Davidson, Duke, Emory, Georgia Institute of Technology, Northwestern, Princeton, Trinity, Vanderbilt, William and Mary, and the Universities of Chicago, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, Notre Dame, and Tennessee.

A nurse supervises the infirmary, and emergency facilities are available at a nearby hospital.

Student Body

The Lovett School enrolls 1445 students (723 boys, 722 girls), 4 to 18 years of age, in Kindergarten through Grade 12. There are 132 students in Preschool (Kindergarten and Prefirst); 376 in the Lower School (Grades 1-5); 362 in the Middle School (Grades 6-8); and 575 in the Upper School (Grades 9-12). Students come from the Atlanta area and surrounding counties.

Student Life

Essential to the life of the Lovett community is the spiritual development of the individual. Under the leadership of the school chaplains, each school participates in its own weekly chapel service, with the students being an integral part of the planning and the service itself. We encourage participation in the chapel services, which are held in the Christian tradition, while we respect and observe the personal beliefs and traditions of others.

The Honor System has been established in each of the schools in order to instill the meaning of the Honor Code. In the Preschool, Lower School, and Middle School, the principals are charged with implementing the code. In the Upper School, the student-elected Honor Council, under the direction of a faculty advisor, handles infractions of the Honor Code.



Academics

Since early learning experiences are so important to later academic success, the Lovett Preschool curriculum addresses the development of basic cognitive, conceptual and motor skills.

At Lovett, academic readiness involves pre-reading skills at the kindergarten level and the acquisition of reading skills in the prefirst grade. The language arts program is designed to expand the student's speaking and thinking vocabulary and help develop an appreciation of literature and poetry.

Problem-solving ability is strengthened so that each student can progress from the stage of manipulative and concrete experience to a higher level of abstract thinking in science and mathematics.

Each child's major motor development is advanced by physical education, while small motor skills are refined by a variety of tactile games and a specialized writing program.

To develop an appreciation for music, daily instruction is given in rhyming, pitch, rhythm, and traditional singing.

Development of the student involves daily recognition by the faculty of each child's self-worth and individual progress. Instruction in Bible courses and weekly chapel services strengthen each child's values. Creative and fine arts programs and the "Children Around the World" study extend appreciation of each young person's heritage and his or her importance in the contemporary world.

The multi-faceted curriculum, combined with the freedom to plan and learn independently, meets the specific needs of the individual child while insuring an opportunity for each student to contribute positively to the group.

Student Activities

During the course of the school year many special activities are enjoyed by the children. These may include a Circus Day, Father's Day, the Spring Fling which features the art work of the children, and a magic show. Two very special events of the year are the Thanksgiving chapel service, when the students bring canned goods to share with those less fortunate, and the traditional Christmas chapel service.





Academics

The curriculum design of the Lower School (Grades 1-5) follows a traditional emphasis on the basics.

Language instruction in reading blends phonetics, sight reading, and language experiences to assist the child with this crucial skill.

The teaching of writing utilizes a process approach which stresses idea development. Only after the idea is fully developed are the mechanics of grammar and usage applied. A study of literature and vocabulary round out language instruction.

Mathematics is a basic skill emphasized in the Lower School. Concepts and computation are equally stressed and computers are used to help make learning mathematics fun.

Science and social studies are key skill areas taught by daily instruction. These disciplines encourage rational thought and further the process-oriented technique. To provide the "doing" rather than just the "reading", the experimental philosophy of the SCIIS science program is used.

All Lower School youngsters receive weekly instruction in art, music, physical education, Bible, computer skills, and outdoor education. Such subjects broaden children's horizons as well as make learning interesting. The School has resource teachers on staff to teach these special subject areas.

The instructional day is complete with an after-school program of enrichment in visual arts, choral and instrumental music, intramural sports and environmental education. Most Lower School students participate in one or more of these activities.

Student Activities

The Lower School offers various educational and service -oriented activities. Under the supervision of experienced faculty, the students may take field trips to such places as Sope Creek and Jekyll Island.

The student council sponsors cookouts and movie nights for all Lower School students, Christmas caroling at nearby hospitals, and an aluminum can drive. Father's Day is a very special event in the Lower School, as well as Grandparent's Day, and the Christmas Lessons and Carols Service is a valued Lower School tradition.



Academics

Middle School instruction focuses on helping the student make the transition from elementary to secondary school as the youngster emerges from childhood to adolescence.

After they have mastered the introductory skills of the primary years, students are ready to pursue a variety of academic interests and are able to develop more disciplined methods of organizing their time and studies. As their capacity for abstract thinking grows, the shaping of their personalities accelerates.

The Middle School curriculum offers a carefully selected blend of training in fundamental skills while reinforcing individual interests.

Courses in English and reading in the sixth and seventh grades emphasize comprehension, while the study of literature, composition, grammar, and vocabulary expand the student's intellectual horizon. Mathematics courses emphasize computational skills and concepts.

Students in the seventh and eighth grades may be placed in either enriched or honors level courses in English, mathematics, and science to allow for the expression of individual abilities and interests.

Middle School students study world history, geography and American history, as well as earth science, life science and physical science, emphasizing in each, concept formation and hands-on laboratory experiences.

The fine arts are a part of every student's schedule with opportunities for individual selections among various electives, including choral music, instrumental music, and strings.

Mini-courses are taught in Bible, art, drama, and computers, while foreign language study begins in the eighth grade.

In addition to daily physical education, students are encouraged to participate in a variety of team and individual sports.

The Middle School is designed to meet the needs of the individual student who is developing at his or her own pace, while preparing the student for the accelerated college-preparatory secondary curriculum.

During these years, students move from a partially self-contained classroom experience to departmentalized instruction where increased academic concentration is required.

Student Activities

The Middle School students may participate in a variety of extracurricular activities ranging from service-oriented projects to field trips. The Vestry and Student Council are two of the service organizations, and field trips are planned to a nearby monastery, Washington, D.C., and Redstone arsenal in Huntsville, Alabama. *The Lion's Eye* is the Middle School student newspaper reporting on school, community, and national issues. Additionally, activities are planned by the homeroom teachers to coincide with seasonal events during the year.



Academics

The Lovett Upper School's curriculum rests solidly on careful teaching of the traditional academic disciplines: English, math, science, history, and foreign language. Each academic department has come to be known for fundamental strengths within its discipline; the English department for its strong teaching of composition skills applied to literary studies; the math department for its guidance of students in the transition from simple computation to the more cerebral algebra, analysis, calculus, and computer languages; science for the sophistication of its lab facilities; history, for its emphasis on primary sources of historical research; and foreign languages, for the special touch native speakers give to the classroom experience.

Just as important to the Upper School experience, however, are the unique opportunities students have to learn from teachers who themselves continue to learn enthusiastically. A teacher of American history brings to the classroom slides and narrative from his summer trip to the major Indian battlegrounds of the West. A German teacher lectures to the Goethe Institute in Tennesee and brings back to the classroom ideas shared with teachers throughout the Southeast. A Biology teacher spends part of his summer setting up a student hiking trip to the Appalachian Trail for the next summer. An art teacher knowing the excitement of having his own works exhibited, applauds the appearance of his students' work at the Piedmont Arts festival. A geometry teacher's experience at the Wilson Institute of Princeton University finds immediate application in elementary through secondary grades. An English teacher shares the work of rehearsal and the satisfaction of performing choral works which set to music the poems of Walt Whitman and George Herbert, whom he has taught in the classroom. These shared learning experiences enhance the classroom curriculum. Yet even more, they represent true teaching by modeling what true learning is.

No Upper School teacher is far from a sporting event, as a coach or cheering spectator. The day often ends not with the tutorial period from 2:50-3:30 p.m. but with teachers taking the court, the ballfield, or the cross-country route with the students. Mutual admiration found on the sporting field carries over into a more trusting, supportive atmosphere in the classroom. In addition, Upper School teachers and students take pride in the traditions of service and enrichment which clubs like the Vestry, Interact, Ecology Club, and Foreign Language Club offer. Monthly publication of the *Lion-o-Type*, our school newspaper, and the appearance of the *Signature*, our creative writing and arts magazine, are eagerly awaited.

The Lovett Upper School is a place of challenge and excitement to all on its campus. As it regularly sends well-prepared students off to fine colleges and universities throughout the nation, the school eagerly greets their return visits, formally and informally letting the school know of the importance of their Lovett years to their developing careers.

Student Activities

The Upper School student has many activities from which to choose, including the school newspaper, foreign language clubs, the Ecology Club, the Photography Club, or Vestry, to name a few. Student representatives are elected to the Upper School Council, a group which sponsors special events and coordinates student activities. Among the traditional school events are Homecoming, the Christmas Dance, the Spring Concert, and the Spring Dance.

Varsity sports teams compete interscholastically in baseball, basketball, cross-country, diving, football, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, and wrestling. The Lovett athletic program has produced 16 state championships over the past seven years.

Tuition is payable in accordance with the terms outlined in the enrollment contract. Refunds of tuition or cancellation of unpaid charges will not be made upon absence, withdrawal, or dismissal. The Tuition Refund Plan is available to parents at a nominal cost to insure a prorata refund of tuition in the event of withdrawal.

Parents who wish to spread tuition costs over monthly installments may make arrangements with outside financing institutions. The Lovett School Business Office can refer parents to several organizations which provide such financing.

The tuition includes lunch for Prefirst through Grade 12. Accident insurance is available for a nominal fee.

Admissions

In all grades, new students are admitted on the basis of testing, school records, teacher recommendations, and a personal interview, without regard to race, color, creed, sex, national, and ethnic origins, to all rights, privileges, programs, and activities available to students at The Lovett School.

The status of legacy accorded to students whose parents or grandparents have attended The Lovett School and/or whose siblings have been or are currently enrolled at The Lovett School is one of the factors considered in a student's application.

The expansion levels are Kindergarten (four year old program) and grades 5, 7, and 9, but openings occur at all levels. Applications for fall enrollment should be made one year in advance. The application deadline for the preschool program is January 1, while it is February 1 for grades 1 - 12. Late applications may be accepted depending upon enrollment. There is a \$50 nonrefundable application fee. Admissions decisions are made in the spring and notification letters are mailed in early April.

Financial Aid

The Lovett School subscribes to the School Scholarship Service and grants financial assistance to families who qualify on the basis of need. Priority consideration is given to students in grades 6 - 12, although anyone may apply.

INFORMATION FOR 1986-87

School

The Lovett School is an independent college preparatory coeducational day school founded in 1926. The school is governed by a selfperpetuating Board of Trustees. Located on a 100-acre wooded site, the school has 1445 students in preschool through 12th grade (575 students in grades 9-12). The Class of 1987 numbers 142. The parent body is composed largely of professional and managerial people and a high percentage of parents are college graduates.

Faculty

The school has 149 certified professional staff; 83 have the master's degree and 3 hold doctorate degrees. The average teaching experience of the faculty is 12 years and for 33% of the staff it is over 15 years. There is a ratio of one faculty member to each 11 students

Guidance

Guidance in the Upper School is coordinated by two certified counselors, assisted by the school chaplain and Upper School faculty members who each supervise a group of students.

Advanced Placement

Advanced Placement courses are regularly offered in English, French, Chemistry, Latin, American History, European History, Biology, Spanish, Calculus, and Computers. In 1986 a total of 93 students took 178 examinations of which 80% were grades of '3' or greater.

Accreditation

The school is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The school holds membership in ERB, GISA, SSATB, SAIS, NAES, NAIS, CEEB, CSS, CRIS, CASE, AAAIS, ISM, and NACAC.

Marking Periods

Lovett schedules a two (2) semester (summer semester optional) calendar year. Semesters consist of eighteen (18) weeks. Each academic semester course yields 1/2 Carnegie unit of credit and 22 Carnegie units are required for graduation.

Class Rank

Although all members of the Class of 1987 are ranked, class rank is not a strong indicator for predicting college performance since usually all graduates go on to college. Small differences in grade point averages can make significant differences in rank. Only grades earned at Lovett are used in computing rank; Advanced Placement and honors courses receive a statistical boost.



Visiting artists address classes while monthly exhibitions in the school's Galleria area showcase worthy artwork of all media and of professional as well as student artists.








Students study and practice in two separate instrumental rooms, a fully equipped choral rehearsal room, or in one of the soundproof modules available on campus.



Language students have opportunities for foreign travel and student exchange programs.



Admissions

All financial aid procedures are handled through the Admissions Office.


